Everyone who submits an abstract for the academic component of the conference will be asked to consider the impacts of animal agriculture and the climate crisis on animals. That said, and first and foremost, please understand that the conference is a **transdisciplinary animal studies event**. So, if your paper does not in any way consider animal agriculture and the climate crisis, your abstract will not be excluded and will indeed be considered for inclusion in the programme.

We believe that the greatest threats posed to the planet, to all planetary life, human or nonhuman animal, plant or otherwise, including the current pandemic, is the intersection of animal agriculture and the climate crisis. Hence, the urgency and criticality of climate as the key theme.

Besides the overarching theme and how that is impacting individuals and habitats, all life on our fragile planet, we have also proposed the following and linked sub-themes for your consideration and to help you focus your abstract submission and conference debate:

- Compassionate conservation, restoration ecology and rewilding
- The biodiversity crisis and climate change
- The animal industrial complex
- Animals, the circular economy and sustainable food systems
- Animals in development and food sovereignty
- First Nations and decolonisation
- Educating with and for Animals
- Animals, the law and public policy
- Multi-species justice
- Personhood, animal philosophy and bioethics

We also encourage papers that consider animals in art, biodiversity conservation, gender studies, literature, religion, film, the media, medicine, politics, science, veterinary science, the zoological sciences.....and, as for all previous Minding Animals Conferences, the list goes on.....

## Thinking About and Presenting At the Conference

Importantly, and unlike previous conferences, there will be delegates from a broader cross-section of society. There will be delegates from government, politics, corporations and industry that will have quite divergent views on how nonhuman animals are perceived/utilised/treated/exploited. In considering nonhuman animals, to not just talk to the 'converted', and to reach tangible outcomes for the future, we believe this is a necessary conference objective. Thus, this conference will seek to encourage dialogue and impart change from a broad cross-section of society.

Minding Animals Conferences are <u>NOT</u> animal rights conferences, abolitionist conferences, or wildlife conservation or zoology conferences, or animal welfare conferences, or anthrozoology conferences, environmental conferences, or veterinary conferences, they are <u>ALL</u> that!

And like all previous conferences, we stress to all delegates who attend MAC5 that they participate in a spirit of honesty and cooperation, accepting that other delegates may have very divergent opinions on how animals are perceived/utilised/treated/exploited, but always with the overall objective of protecting animals, no matter in what form or time frame, with the objective to reach better outcomes for nonhuman animals. Nonetheless, we urge active and critical debate with your fellow delegates.

#### Our Vision

The driving mechanisms of climatic change, the cascading impacts of wildfires, drought and heatwaves, flooding, melting icecaps and glaciers, are all increasing suffering and jeopardising the already fraught survival responses many animals face. Further, we believe that unchecked growth and consumption of animals is threatening all life, human or nonhuman animal, plant or otherwise. There is critical urgency in understanding and responding to these threats, at local, regional, and global scales. The ramifications for animals have received only superficial attention to date. Energy is needed to consider how best to support animals through these increasingly prevalent events as well as fostering paradigmatic change in food production and consumption.

Our considered response will only materialise through evaluation of empirical evidence, through discourse among disciplines of environmental and social theory, and through centring of indigenous voices to create inclusive, transparent, and ethically just policy and actions. This is no time for siloed debate and insular decision making. We have therefore created a truly novel space for the intersection of animal studies, animal protection, indigenous perspectives, and conservation science to provide scholars, practitioners, and the community a place to meet and facilitate public and scholarly debates.

Hosted by the Centre for Compassionate Conservation at the University of Technology Sydney, we have designed a conference program to draw upon the co-held values of respect and compassion for all life. The conference will also benefit from the UTS pledge to foster a diverse, inclusive and thriving community, and its goal of cultivating sustainability and social justice values.

We will bring academic rigour to the challenge of tackling the planetary crisis driven by climatic change and animal agriculture by addressing the intersectionality of issues studied within the Humanities, Arts and Social Science (HASS) and Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM).

Drawing upon a wide variety of knowledge, including First Nation perspectives, delegates will be drawn not only from academia, but also from government, politics, corporations, and industry, harnessing divergent views on how nonhuman animals are perceived and treated to ensure that issues are considered broadly. Key will be identifying gaps in knowledge and policy actions to support all animals, how they are perceived, and whether they are captive (companions, livestock, zoos) or wild (pest or invasive [that is, out of place], endangered, or common and thriving).

# **Key Aspects of the Conference**

## The Host

The host of Minding Animals Conference 5 will the Centre for Compassionate Conservation (CCC) located within the Transdisciplinary School at the University of Technology, Sydney (UTS). CCC is the leading research and education centre of the interdisciplinary field of compassionate conservation. It conducts research around the world, including Australia, South Africa, USA, Middle East and Asia, to develop compassionate approaches to conservation challenges. It focusses on critical conservation challenges such as stemming extinction, resolving human wildlife conflict, ending wildlife trade, enhancing the welfare of wild animals, and promoting coexistence.

#### Climate

Winter in central Sydney tends to be mild where the lows rarely drop below 5C (41°F), and highs hover at around 15–22C (59–72°F), mainly due to proximity to the ocean. Furthermore, Sydney CBD has never recorded frost. Nevertheless, we do recommend you bring a warm jacket and additional clothing if you intend to stay for longer in Australia, particular if travelling inland or to more southerly environments, such as Tasmania, Melbourne or the Australian Alps.

## **COVID** and other health concerns

Australia no longer has any restrictions regarding COVID19. We will have masks and hand sanitiser available for delegates at the door if desired. We nonetheless recommend vaccination before you travel. As it will be winter in July, you should also consider the influenza vaccine.

Also note that Australia is malaria free. And, ONLY if you intend to handle or study bats during your stay in Australia, we recommend rabies vaccinations as Australian bats are known to carry Lyssavirus.

We would also like to remind delegates to not forget to bring all their requisite medication.

# **Interfaith Service Keynote Speaker**





Candace Laughinghouse began her personal transformation by theological education from the Candler School of Theology (MDiv), Duke Divinity School (ThM) and Chicago Theological Center (PhD) with a pedestrian interest in the Black church. Her transformation into anti-speciesist ecowomanism forged beyond any particular religious denomination, thus allowing her to experience a consciousness of God and of herself as the Imago Dei. In the power and knowledge of this transformation, she continues to evolve into this newness of caring for creation by highlighting shared oppressions and indigenous perspectives as a more authentic theory and praxis in social justice that includes all of Creation. Candace's work within interfaith projects, lectures and writings inform her research and energises her to understand that while humans may be culturally different, we are elementally identical as we breathe the same air. As such, she is an emerging leader in eco justice and animal justice to save the planet, our families, and humanity's future quality of life. She currently teaches at St. Augustine's University and is recipient of various consults and teaching fellowships. Candace also serves on the board of the Womanist Approaches to Religion and Society, the Black Religious Scholars Group, the Culture and Arts Foundation and recently contributed to an online lectionary centralising farm animals through CreatureKind. Her greatest commitment and accomplishment is her three young daughters and raising them in the awareness of God's love for all Creation.

## John Woinarski




John Woinarski is a professor of conservation biology at Charles Darwin University. His research focuses mostly on the ecology and conservation of Australian biodiversity, with particular interest in island biogeography; the impacts of fire, forestry, habitat loss and mining; the impacts of introduced animals, especially cats; extinction; monitoring; and management. Much of his life has been devoted to research on and conservation of threatened bird and mammal species. He has published about 300 scientific journal articles, numerous popular articles, and authored or edited 12 books, including *A bat's end: the Christmas Island pipistrelle and extinction in Australia, The Nature of Northern Australia: natural values, ecological processes and future prospects, The Action Plan for Australian Mammals, Recovering Australian Threatened Species: a book of hope and Cats in Australia: companion and killer.* 

# **Invited Speakers**

#### Roberto Marchesini

Roberto Marchesini is Director of the School of Human Animal Interaction and the Center for the Study of Posthumanist Philosophy, both based in Bologna, Italy. He teaches applied ethology in many Italian Universities in Masters dedicated to animal welfare and behavioural medicine. His research focused on the theme of animal subjectivity and the ontology of animality, promoting a philosophical ethology perspective. Roberto has a degree in veterinary medicine and is Director of the journal Animal Studies. He has published hundreds of articles on the topics of animal bioethics.



Roberto's major publications include: Over the human: Post-humanism and the Concept of Animal Epiphany, Dialogo Ergo Sum, Beyond Anthropocentrism, The Virus Paradigm, with Marco Celentano Critical Ethology and Post-Anthropocentric Ethics, The Creative Animal: How Every Animal Builds its Own Existence, and Technophysiology or How Technology Modifies the Self. In 2018, Jeffrey Bussolini, Brett Buchanan and Mattew Chrulew published the essay The Philosophical Ethology of Roberto Marchesini reporting his proposal for the ontology of animality. **Anja Heister** 




Born and raised in Germany, Anja Heister, is an independent researcher, writer and lifelong proponent of animal liberation - domestic and wild. Anja believes in the need for dismantling 'human supremacy' and doing so by cultivating empathy and compassion for all animal persons. A former wildlife campaigner, Anja co-founded Footloose Montana in 2007, a non-profit organisation dedicated to ending the trapping of wild animals on public land in Montana. She created and then taught the organisation's popular trap-release program for several years - workshops offered to the public at no costs to learn about trapping regulations and how to free one's companion animal from a trap or snare. Anja is a champion for the Just One Health approach for social change and publishes frequently on topics related to wild animal conservation, animal liberation, ethics, and policy. She is the author of Beyond the North American Model of Wildlife Conservation: From Lethal to Compassionate Conservation.

## Jeff Sebo

Jeff Sebo is Associate Professor of Environmental Studies, Affiliated Professor of Bioethics, Medical Ethics, Philosophy, and Law, Director of the Animal Studies MA Program, Director of the Mind, Ethics, and Policy Program, and Co-Director of the Wild Animal Welfare Program at New York University. He is the author of *Saving Animals, Saving Ourselves* (2022) and co-author of *Chimpanzee Rights* (2018) and *Food, Animals, and the Environment* (2018). Jeff is also an executive committee member at the Center for Environmental and Animal Protection, an advisory board member at the Insect Welfare Research Society, a senior research fellow at the Legal Priorities Project, and a mentor at Sentient Media.

#### Glenn Albrecht

Glenn A. Albrecht is an Honorary Associate in the School of Geosciences, The University of Sydney, New South Wales, Australia. He retired as Professor of Sustainability, Walter Murdoch University, in mid2014. He continues to work as an environmental philosopher and published *Earth Emotions* in 2019 (also published in French and Spanish). In numerous publications and public talks over the last two decades, Glenn has developed the theme of the psychoterratic (psyche-earth), or negative and positive emotional states connected to the state of the Earth. New concepts, developed by him, are now becoming well established in the international scholarly literature, new research theses and as inspiration for many creative people in the arts and music. He currently lives at Wallaby Farm on Wonnarua Land in NSW. He describes himself as a 'farmosopher', combining thinking and writing with growing food and protecting a haven for wildlife. While he is best known for creating the concept of solastalgia, or the lived experience of negative environmental change, his most recent work develops the mega-meme of the 'Symbiocene', a future state where humans reintegrate with the rest of nature. A book of that title should be completed and published by the end of 2024.

After a four year break the Animal Activists Forum is reborn as Animal Rights Forum, and returns to Melbourne Town Hall in February. The event exists to promote networking between Australian animal advocates, to provide opportunities for education and training of activists, and share experience among activists.

With a packed agenda of over 30 talks and 50 speakers, the aim is to cover all aspects on Animal Rights, and whilst organised in line with a vegan philosophy, the event aims to be wide in scope, with the hope that our movement will benefit from networking between activists working in diverse areas. For the first time ever we will be offering an online livestream of our main room.

For the first time, the forum will host the Animal Defenders Expo where animal protection groups can present their information, and network with activists. The Expo is a great opportunity for groups to find new volunteers, and volunteers to find opportunities.



**Animal Justice Awards** 

The forum is also working with The Animal Justice foundation to present the 2024 Animal Justice Awards, which will be presented on the Saturday afternoon, after the first day of the Forum. Following the awards, there will be a celebratory canapé evening, on the Town Hall's iconic Balcony! Tickets for the social evening are sold separately from the forum, but through the same booking system.

As in previous years, local activists will be hosting activist events in the centre of the city. So, if you are available on the day before the forum, come and join us, the day of activism aims to be friendly to new activists, entirely peaceful, and is a great introduction to practical activism, and working with new people from across Australia.
